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

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

MEMBERSHIP CORNER

Welcome to the Casino Collectible Association's Membership Corner. My name is Roy Nelson and I am your new CCA Membership Officer. As your Membership Officer I have two critical jobs. The first is to increase our recruitment efforts—bring new members to the CCA. The second is to hold on to members once they join—keep them with us. To do both will require everyone to participate a little more. After all, 'Membership Is Everyone's Job!

RECRUITMENT

One way we are going to increase our recruitment efforts is by providing more recognition and incentives for those who sign up new members. If you sign up a new member, or get a former member to rejoin, I'm going to send you a 'Recruiter Chip' valued at \$5. Is a \$5 Recruiter Chip a huge incentive? Of course not, but it is an important way of saying, "Thanks for caring about our club". And what can you do with your Recruiter Chip? Well, you can use it to make purchases from our club table at the annual convention or through on-line orders. You can collect them, trade them, or better yet wear one in your badge holder during the convention to show others that you did your part.

Another recruitment effort we will be starting is offering trial memberships. Trial memberships will be reduced rate memberships from 6-10 months to "try us out." The goal is to convert these trial memberships to regular memberships when the trial period is over.

So, we are starting off by doing a couple of things that give incentives to recruiting new members. But what about keeping these new folks?

RETENTIONS

Our recruitment efforts over the past 3 years would probably earn us a "C" grade—about average for a club our size. But of the 221 new people who joined CCA over that time we lost 63% of them in their first two years. We failed to give them a reason to continue their association with us. We didn't show them the added value that CCA membership brings to our hobby. We didn't tell them enough about our history and our future. We didn't show them that we aren't just a group of folks who buy and sell casino memorabilia; we are in the business of "Preserving Gaming History". In short, we just didn't have a plan for keeping these new members. And here is where you come in. Remember, "Membership Is Everyone's Job!"

A successful plan needs ideas and input from lots of perspectives, so I ask you to think about: --What benefits you get from CCA membership. (Aside from our award-winning magazine.)

- --What benefits you would like to get from your CCA membership.
- --What do you think would keep new members coming back year after year?

Once you have spent some time thinking about these questions email me at membership@ccgtcc.com and tell me what you have come up with. Your responses will help formulate our retention plan and contribute greatly to keeping our new folks as continuing members.

MEMBERSHIP GOALS

Our current reality is we have been losing about 6% of our membership (about 80 folks) annually for the past few years. On June 1 of this year we have 1252 members (regular, life and associate). My personal goal is that by June 1, 2020 (roughly 2 years from now), our % loss will be zero. How do we do that? Simple really. We increase the number of people who join, and we decrease the number of people who leave us.

Again, that's where you come in. Remember, "Membership Is Everyone's Job!"I'm asking each of you to make a commitment to our club. Make a commitment to bring one new member to the club. Make a commitment to talk to someone you know who is a member is no longer and get them to reconsider. Make a commitment to talk to members of your local club who aren't CCA members about joining. Or make a commitment in any other way your can to do your part to grow our club. If we all do a little more it will make a big difference!

Thanks for reading my first Membership Corner and look for it again next time. Roy



Letter to the Editors

We did not receive any Letters to the Editor for this issue, so I am going to use this space to discuss some messages that were passed through Jerry Vergatos to me from the convention. The areas discussed were the use of two names being used for the organization in the magazine, the cost of printing, and the timeliness of the magazine getting to the users. So to let members know they are being heard, I am going to discuss what is happening in the magazine.

First issue is that the magazine is confusing as to what our organization's name is. Our official name is Casino Collectibles Association, a subsidiary of CC>CC Inc., which is on the masthead. Both the magazine and the website are in the process of converting all titles to Casino Collectibles Association. The editors of the magazine have been making gradual changes and carried both names for continuity, so there was no major confusion with a complete change all at once. It requires time to read through all club material and convert the name where needed. In the magazine, there are sections that have not been updated in any form for several years. Not being the editor at the time, I do not have the original copy for logos and text, so it needs to be completely recreated.

As to the logo usage policy page, the artwork for a new logo usage is currently being created. The image in the magazine is only an example of how to use it. The statement written below states, that a member must contact the Secretary for a copy of the logo with your membership number on it. The usage policy has not changed with the organization's new name. So when the new image becomes available that will be used.

I know that I have discussed the mailing of the magazine to the membership in a timely manner before. I know that both Robb and I try our best to get the magazine out to meet dates mandated by our constitution, to event schedules, and our lives. If we do not receive enough articles for an issue in a timely fashion, there are several consequences; first being, we run late waiting for articles, second our copy editors get swamped all at once that creates a bottleneck. If there is a shortage Robb and I have to put together more articles which require time, or we have a sixteen-page smaller issue. As I am writing this in mid-July, I have only received three articles, two club business, one on chips. I have posted that I need to have all the articles by the end of July. In an average issue, we need almost 20 articles.

The other timeliness issue regarding the magazine is printing and shipping. Once the magazine is finalized at the printer, it takes four to ten business days to print and ship. Those members that pay extra for first class mail, receive it in about three days after shipping. Bulk mailing can take seven to twenty days to receive. I get mine in seven days. We have no control over foreign mail after it leaves the USPS.

The final topic brought to my attention is the cost of the magazine. This is an area I have not been involved with directly in the past. I feel that the magazine is one of the main reasons to join the club. I know it was the reason I joined over twenty-five years ago. It is the only connection that all our members have. Yes, I know the world is on the web, but not all our members are. Also, many of us still like to read a hard copy. After I get this issue to the printer, I will start looking at what we can do about costs. I will be asking for bids from other printers, check the quality of their work, and services provided.

Important Message from the Auction Chairs

David Spragg & Jay Sands

The 2019 Bruce Landau Memorial Auction will once again be held during the convention, at the South Point Hotel & Casino, on Thursday 20th June 2019.

The Annual Club Auction is the Club's biggest single fundraising event. In recent years there has been a dramatic decline in the number of suitable lots consigned and lots donated in general.

As before, there are no constraints on either the number of consignors or the number of lots they can consign or donate, but that is subject to the terms listed below. I will be contacting all consignors from last year directly in due course but there is no need to wait for me to do so if you are ready to consign now.

What we are in need of is more consignors/donors and we, therefore, ask all members to help us.

The auction will, as usual, comprise approx 200 lots (including donated lots), of which a small number of the donated lots (probably 20) will be sold by silent auction in advance and on the first day of the convention. Bulky lots have caused us a problem in the past, in terms of the preparation of the auction and catalog, cost of return of unsold items, and the additional cost of shipping sold items. Consequently, I ask that consigners submit as many suitable single chip lots as possible, and I will only consider larger lots on their individual merit. If anyone has anything at all that he or she wishes to donate, then in view of the fact the club gets the full proceeds, and there is a guaranteed sale, we will be more flexible over what will be accepted, and, we reserve the right to combine donated lots together if appropriate. The club makes considerably more money from donated lots than the consignments, and being that is the purpose of the auction, I strongly urge anyone who is willing to donate chips to do so.

Bidding on ALL donated lots will once again start at just \$5. While we intend to retain a minimum bid of \$50 or above on the majority of consigned items for the purposes of advance/proxy bidding, the auctioneer will have the discretion to reduce that opening bid in the case of there being no bids, so please bear that in mind when consigning. Reserves may still be set for lots valued at \$500 and up. All other terms and conditions will remain unchanged and will be available to view in full on the club website or via email. Please therefore only consider consigning items that have a realistic chance of selling for \$50 or more.

You may consign lots (subject to the standard 10% sellers commission, which will be waived in the event of a consignor buying back a lot – 10% buyers premium is still payable) and/or you can donate lots where the club retains the proceeds.

There will be no printed consignment form. Instead, we invite would be consignors to contact us (preferably by email) to determine the suitability of lots. Please DO NOT SEND ANYTHING without contacting us first.

We will be at the Las Vegas Superbowl Chip show in early February and can collect auction lots from vendors there. Those consignors attending the show that do not have email, please have any lots ready for us. If you are not attending the show and have lots to donate or consign, please don't wait to contact us, the earlier the better.

We plan to have the auction catalog available approx 6 weeks in advance (i.e. early May). It will also be made available online for anyone wishing to view, download or print as soon as it is completed. Consequently, the latest date that anyone can contact me to consign lots will be February 4th, 2019.

From the President's Desk

Greetings to my fellow club members.

CONVENTION

Steve Palumbo did a fantastic job coordinating this years 30th anniversary convention. Utilizing a larger space, he managed to create a very user-friendly environment. I'm sure with the experience he gained next years convention will be even better. He has already started working on some of the details. I'm sure he would welcome all your comments and suggestions.

MEMBERSHIP

Rick Timmins presented a very detailed and well thought out proposal for the Board to consider. He was given the go ahead to proceed with items approved by the CCA Board. We are very excited with his enthusiasm and vision on how to increase our membership.

The CCA BOD has approved a modest increase in the dues for Annual Membership to \$35 dollars a year effective January 1, 2019. Due to rising costs and inflation on the services that the club provides, an increase is warranted at this time. The last increase was in 2006. The BOD constantly endeavors to keep costs to a minimum and is very cognizant of the financial burden this may place on some of our membership. Our decision did not come lightly.

Until December 31, 2018, we are offering a "Early Buy In" whereby you can renew your membership at the current rate for as many years as you like regardless of your renewal or expiration date. The current rates for multi-year renewals are also eligible for the promotion. The Life Membership rate and eligibility will remain the same also at this time and is eligible for the "Early Buy In" promotion. After January 1, 2019 the new rate times (X) your age will apply accordingly. After January 1, 2019 the multi-year rates will also be adjusted accordingly. 
MARK LIGHTERMAN RECEIVES ANA'S LIFETIME ACHIEVMENT AWARD

The **Lifetime Achievement Award** is presented to an individual, family, firm or judicial entity that has made outstanding contributions to organized numismatics. Energetic, organized and seldom without his clipboard in hand, life member and National Exhibit Coordinator **Mark Lighterman** is the 2018 recipient. Lighterman will be honored during the World's Fair of Money in Philadelphia.

An avid American Numismatic Association promoter, Lighterman has been a national volunteer since 2003, taking on his current duties as national exhibit coordinator in 2008. He chaired the ANA Exhibiting Committee from 2005 to 2009, and today also serves the ANA as the parliamentarian. Lighterman is president of Com¬bined Organizations of Numismatic Error Collectors of America (CONECA), treasurer of the Token and Medal Society (TAMS), past president of Florida United Numismatists (FUN), and a charter member of the Casino Chip and Gaming Token Collectors Club. He has written articles for The Numismatist and CONECA's bimonthly publication, ErrorScope.

Lighterman is always looking for new Florida gaming tokens to add to his collection, and he avidly pursues error coins. Among his many major off-metal strikes are a \$20 gold piece struck on a large cent, a Flying Eagle cent struck on a half dime, and a 1934 Peace dollar struck on a quarter. Although the latter is one of his ¬favorites, he quickly notes that all his coins are important to him. Several years ago, Whitman Publishing sought him out for his expertise, and in 2010 he contributed to Nich¬olas P. Brown's 100 Greatest U.S. Error Coins.

In 2009 Lighterman took his place alongside fellow hobbyists in the Casino Chip and Gaming Token Collectors Club's Hall of Fame. He was recognized as CONECA's Lyndon King Outstanding Member of the Year in 2012 and inducted into the organization's Hall of Fame in 2014. The ANA presented him its Presidential Award in 1999, the Glenn Smedley Memorial Award in 2002, Medal of Merit in 2012, Adna G. Wilde Jr. Award for Excellence in 2015, and Farran Zerbe Memorial Award for Distinguished Service in 2016.

A New Approach to Growing Our Hobby and Our Club

Well, a lot has happened since I wrote an article for last year's Winter issue of the club magazine. If you recall, in that article I suggested that we hire a full-time Executive Director to lead our club and grow our hobby. Most members choose not to move forward with that suggestion, however while I was at the Chip Show in Las Vegas during Super Bowl weekend, I met with several individuals, including members of the CCA Board. We collectively decided on a different approach that I would like to share with all of you.

This new approach led to the formation of a committee of CCA member volunteers in mid-February that agreed on a mission to develop a set of initiatives to grow the hobby and grow club membership. It is that activity that I would now like to share with you, and more importantly the activities ahead of us.


The decision to form a committee and ask for volunteers to serve on this committee was announced on the Chipboard in early February and a total of eight people volunteered to serve:


All meetings were held via conference calls and more than 10 meetings were conducted from February through early June. The end result of this committee was a series of recommendations that was shared with the CCA Board of Directors on Tuesday, June 19, just prior to the Annual Chip Show at the South Point Casino. Coming out of that meeting were two key action items that will involve more time and participation from hopefully several volunteers going forward.

One of the considerations that this committee viewed as important was to hear from club members. That concern led to the creation of a member survey. A series of questions with multiple choice responses along with opportunities for writein comments was developed. Between May 1 and May 15 the survey was sent electronically to 840 members with valid email accounts. A total of 235 members participated in the survey which is a very good response rate of 28%. This high response rate means we have a statistically accurate survey.

As you can see form the survey responses many of our most senior club members participated in the survey with most of these members also attending our Annual Club Convention/Show.




Another important piece of information is that 60% of our members only visit our club website once a month, a few times a year or never go to the site compared to 53% of members that are on the Chipboard website daily---quite a difference!!



Growing Our Hobby and Our Club continued

However as you can see from the member responses two-thirds of our membership believes it is very important to update our member website. Also, a surprising 54% of our members believe the club should be using more social media forms of communication.



Finally an important question was asked of our members-- "are you planning to renew your membership?" While 92% said "yes" and 8% said "no," that still means a potential of 85 members are likely not to renew their club membership. This is in line with the annual declining number of members of the CCA club over the last several years.



As mentioned earlier there was also the opportunity for members to write-in comments and suggestions. The Top 3 writein member suggestions were the following:

- 1-create a more friendly and useful website
- 2-increase social media presence
- 3-find new ways to attract young collectors to the hobby and the club

As the committee reviewed the survey information and worked on a number of action items on its own, the committee developed seven recommendations which were presented to the CCA Board of Directors just prior to the Chip Show.

From this discussion at that Board Meeting came the suggestion from the CCA

Board for two key committees going forward:

1-A committee to work on the updating of the CCA website and the increase of social media communication

2-A committee to work on increasing membership of the club and people interested in our hobby

Let's expand a little more about the focus of both of these committees going forward.

The first committee is going to develop an action plan to update our club website and to make it more relevant to current and prospective club members. To do this we plan to work with a third party web development company that specializes in this type of work. The committee had many suggestions to improve this site along with several suggestions from members. All will be utilized. We feel it is critical to have a website that is useful and informative to our members and prospective members and frankly the current website does not do that. At the end of the day the website needs to be a value-add resource to everyone.

The second area of focus for this same committee is expand our use of social media communication methods. We need to take advantage of tools such as Facebook, Instagram, YouTube videos and others for communication and training opportunities. We will benchmark other organizations that do this well in order to come up with ways we can take advantage of these tools. I plan to personally be involved on this committee.

The second committee is going to work on increasing our club membership. Again a number of suggestions came from both the original committee and member write-in suggestions from the survey. This includes creating "digital" and "paper" tear sheet on our club and hobby, incentives to recruit new members, and ways to better educate and communicate amongst members which we feel will increase member retention and also eventually increase membership. We are fortunate that newly elected CCA Board member and Membership Director, Roy Nelson, has agreed to serve as the Chairman for this important committee.

In order for us to make progress on these two committees and tasks we need help. We need volunteers to serve on these two committees for the next year. One of the questions we asked of our members in the May survey was their willingness to volunteer of their time to better the club. We had an excellent response of 27% or 63 members that indicated an interest in volunteering of their time. We want to tap these members to volunteer their time to serve on one of these two committees. If you are interested in participating on one of these committees I am asking you to reach out to me by October 15 (Rick Timmins rtimmins@yahoo.com) and let me know which committee you would like to be a on again for approximately one year. These committees can only be successful if people volunteer to serve and work on these two committees. It is probably going to take about three hours per month to assist on these committees. The CCA Board is also supportive of providing the appropriate funds to assist with these efforts with the right documentation and justification.

As I noted in my article of last fall, and a fact that has been ongoing for the last several years, our club membership and hobby are in decline. If many of us pull together and work on different and new approaches we can try to change the direction we are going. It will take time but we can try to make a difference. It needs the help and efforts of many people. Please reach out to me with your interest and desire to help and let's get going to grow our club and hobby into the future.

MoGH Announcement of Chip Art Collection

Las Vegas, Nevada – August 3, 2019. The Museum of Gaming History announces its first online art exhibit. The exhibit is available on the MoGH's website, themogh.org, under Resources. On exhibit is a collection of 425 hand drawn graphics used in the production casino chips from the 1960's and 70's.

About Chip Art

Prior to the use of computers, graphic artists hand drew their projects. Chip Art are original works of art used to create inlays on casino chips. They usually feature the casino's building or logo. This art was never meant for the collector market, they were made as part of the casino chip production process. Some of these pieces were retained by chip manufacturers, while most were destroyed. The pieces typically became available to the public when the manufacturer closed or was purchased.

The Exhibit

The Chip Art in this exhibit was purchased by David Sarles from Jim Blanchard at Atlantic Standard Molding. The Chip Art was in the archives of the Burt Co. when Jim purchased the company. Some of the Chip Art was sold to several collectors. The balance was shipped to Howard Herz at Gaming Archeology for appraisal. Howard photographed the collection as part of his appraisal. Those photographs were edited for this exhibit. The art was then donated to the Nevada Historical Society in Reno.

Just another day at the Museum... NOT!

What a special day at the Nevada State Museum for the MoGH!!!

With the assistance of MoGH Board members, Steve Palumbo, Ross Poppel, and myself, along with Club Hall of Fame member, Carey Burke, my wife, Pam Focazio, our son Casey Focazio-Follis and the Club's most recent, Early-Bird Banquet Keynote Speaker, Club member and MoGH Gold level member, Ted Whiting, we placed a refresh/enhanced display at the Nevada State Museum, Springs Preserve.

The refresh/enhancement was to clear out one of the five original display cases, filled with various Nevada-only, casino branded, ashtrays, matchbooks and playing cards, and replace them with gaming cheating devices from Ted's personal collection and from the Evidence/Archive lock-up rooms of the Nevada Gaming Control Board's, Enforcement Division, Las Vegas, NV.

Yes, you read that right! In a fairly unprecedented action, the Nevada Gaming Control Board, has placed on-loan to the MoGH, through the assistance of Ted Whiting, for a period of 6-months, about 22 different "cheating" devices and paraphenailia, all of which were confiscated through law enforcement actions in the 90's (or so). As mentioned, this display case is also augmented with several cheating devices from Ted Whiting's personal collection, which he has acquired over the years from various sales.

While this refresh has happened in the later stages of the Nevada State Museum's hosting of the MoGH's 5-display cases Exhibit (the last public viewing date is September 2nd) the MoGH has made arrangements with the Museum to extend the "Cheater Devices" portion of the Exhibit to mid-December, the approximate time that the Gaming Control Board loan to the MoGH expires.

Accordingly, this unique display of cheating devices will continue to be made available for public viewing by the Club's Museum of Gaming History, an Educational Project of the CCA.

The Sting portrayed life of con men, see real tools used at Nevada State Museum

Do you remember the 1973 movie "The Sting" starring Paul Newman and Robert Redford? It was a fabulous flick based on the real life cons of brothers Fred and Charley Gondorff, and won seven of 10 Oscar nominations, including Best Picture, Best Director and Best Original Screenplay.

In the movie Newman and Redford perpetrate a very complex horse betting scam on their "mark," a mob boss, to cheat him out of a large sum of money; definitely a gutsy and dangerous idea.

In real life cons are everywhere, as evidenced by those crazy phone calls and emails we all get about someone in Zimbabwe wanting to share their millions with us or the threat from the "IRS" about "imminent arrest" if we don't immediately take action.

Businesses are also targeted, especially casinos as many swindlers think they are an easy "mark" and, after all, that is where the money is. These cheaters often use special devices and paraphernalia to help them in their quest to amass as much of the casino's money as possible.

But good things don't last forever and these nefarious souls are eventually caught and forced to suffer the legal consequences of their actions, and their special devices usually end up in the evidence and archives storage of the Nevada Gaming Control Board's Enforcement Division or in the hands of private collectors.

Some of these artifacts are actually quite interesting and thanks to the Enforcement Division and Theodore Whiting, a private collector and member of the Casino Collectibles Association (CCA) and Museum of Gaming History (MoGH), you now have a chance to see a large collection on loan to MoGH and displayed at the Nevada State Museum. To find out a bit more about this display we contacted Jim Follis, Board Member of MoGh and CCA vice president. He explained that the Cheater Devices display case is one of five large display cases at the Nevada State Museum, Springs Preserve and each case is themed differently with memorabilia and collectibles from Nevada casinos and slot route businesses.

The Cheater case, Jim told us, is filled with 27 cheating devices and paraphernalia items, including two monkey's paws, four kickstand devices, stringed coins, loaded dice, gaffed dice, a remote viewer wristwatch to read cards passing through a the dealer's shoe, Frankenstein currency and more.

That is some very strange sounding stuff. An internet search tells us a monkey's paw, used by slot cheats, is made of flexible material and has a "claw" on one end. It was inserted into the payout coin chute to make the machine pay out more than it should. The kickstand was also used on slot machines to trick it into paying a jackpot or adding play credits. If you want to know more about these odd sounding items, which date from about 1980 to 2000, head to the Nevada State Museum. The artifacts will be on display through Sunday, Sept. 2, though there are plans to extend the exhibit through mid-December.

MoGH is an educational project of the CCA, an IRS approved, not-for-profit 501(c)(3) organization; and they have several other gaming related displays around town at the El Cortez and Plaza casinos and the NEON and Mob museums. I look forward to seeing all of you next year at the 2019 CCA Convention.


JERRY'S FINAL WORDS:







The summit started with a meet and greet at Oscar's in the bar area. After checking in and mingling for a while, Tina and I had dinner there. The room overlooks **Fremont Street** Experience, and was nice as I remembered it from when it was Centerstage, 30 years ago. Our waiter Nick was a bonus. He regaled us with stories of over thirty years of working in Vegas' best casino restaurants.

Saturday and Sunday the workshops started at 9:30 and ended around 1 PM.

The presenters and moderators had various backgrounds with connections to Las Vegas, law enforcement, academia, and gambling. A few of the speakers spoke in reference to the skim at the Stardust and the movie "Casino," starting with Tony Cullotta. He was followed by Podcaster Gary Jenkins, an ex-Kansas City detective on listening to tapes about the receiving the skim. Pamela Payton, who appeared on local TV's "The Frank Rosenthal Show" as an emcee, finished up the workshops.

In between the other speakers discussed the mob's involvement in Las Vegas in other ways. Ronald Pino's presentation was "Going



Undercover." Pino, the son of the acting boss in Buffalo, and a past Laborers Union official explained how he grew up disliking the mob. Due to his sense of fairness and dislike, he went undercover for the FBI, dealing with the mob's influence on labor unions, and for the CIA in

Russia on local mob influences Presenter J. Michael Niotta discussed. "Early Los Angeles Mob History." Niotta. who is the grandson of two mob members. was

dressed as if he walked

out of the 1930's. One of his grand-fathers was Jack

Dragna, who was involved in mob activities in Los Angeles as well as, rum running during Prohibition, and casino ship gambling off LA's shore. His other grandfather was in Northern California, growing grapes and bottling wine during Prohibition.

Robert Raines, Director of The Gangster Museum of America in Hot Springs, Arkansas

J. Michael Niotta

discussed "Gangsters in Hot Springs." Hot Springs, during and after Prohibition was a haven for the mob, and bank robbers, due to being neutral territory. Owney Madden was one of the first to arrive in Hot Springs to open gaming. Al Capone, Bonnie and Clyde, as many others, were known to visit the area, especially when they were too hot to be at home. The Springs was last bastion of illegal gaming in the US after the Kefauver Hearings lead to closing all the others down. Gambling

in Hot Springs, finally came to a permanent end in 1967 when Governor Winthrop Rockefeller, was elected. He did not need the bribe money, like past governors, being related to John D. Hot Springs AK, has been picked to be the location for the Mob Summit next year.

On Saturday evening, we met in a conference room at the Mob Museum. We were introduced to former Senator and Governor of Nevada Richard Bryan and current Congressman Ruben Kihuen. Senator Bryan participated in a 90 minute question and answer session. He talked about Howard Hughes, financial support for casinos, and the Mormon involvement in the industry. Afterwards, we checked out the new



Speakeasy in the basement of the museum. The bar has a front door that you need to tell them Joe sent vou. There is a menu of mixed drinks from prohibition. While you enjoy your ill gotten beverage, there is live entertainment and exhibits to enjoy.

One of most interesting presenters to me was author Bill Freedman, long time resident of Las Vegas. Bill's background includes teaching the pioneer course in casino management for UNLV's College of Hotel Administration. He authored the seminal

book for succeeding in the casino business, Casino Management. Bill is the only person who has ever managed two Las Vegas Strip casinos simultaneously, and was a friend of both Benny Binion and Moe Dalitz. His curiosity with casinos as a child in Tahoe, and the people in the industry, has lead to many interesting friendships and insights to gaming history. (His books will be reviewed in a later issue)

.So if you have an interest in this area of gaming history, check out the group on Facebook. I found the summit to be interesting and informative. Information from one of the speakers crossed my family history. There was a restaurant called "The English Pub" in Manhattan that my father would have us meet him for dinner between shows (he was a stagehand.) I found out that it was owned by one of NYC's biggest loan sharks.

If they move the date for next year's meeting, I might attend in Hot Springs. As many of you know I'm always up for a road trip.

The Chip on a Shoulder Makes a Winning Story

CCA is a group defined as the Casino Collectibles Association. Like all collectors, they are a group that above everything else, are story collectors.

The first vendor I spoke to at the show this year, had a tremendous collection of chips varying from rare 1940's Siegel gaming chips to present-day hard to find Hard Rock collector chips. Each chip had its own reason for a value beyond face.

The next dealer, did not consider himself a collector per say; instead he referred to himself as chip maker. His story revealed how his company began producing gaming chips at the time when casinos were just becoming mainstream in the public eye. Shortly afterwards, his company became the leading manufacturer for just every major casino in Las Vegas. Today his company produces personalized chips for personal use and marketing events.

The third vendor I talked to was a collector from Reno (Northern California ED), who told his stories of chip hunting as they had just happened the day before. He proudly displayed his treasure case holding 71 Lake Tahoe/ Reno casino chips. There was one chip for every casino, which he personally visited. His look of confidence as he posed for a photo told me he had a special story to go along for each one of those treasured chips. (There seemed to be a little misunderstanding on Lester's part; it was Steve Passalacqua's map of 71 Vintage Lake Tahoe Gambling Casino showing their location, with the image of

34 vintage gambling chips. It is done so well John thought the chips were in there, but they were just pictures of the chips. There were no Reno chips included on the map. The chips are from the 1930's plus; Steve did not personally visit them. Steve is not that old, but may have talked about them so well John thought he visited them. ED)

My last stop at the show was to a standoffish vendor, I referred to as Reluctant Larry. Larry sat behind his booth with his arms crossed and a look of trepidation. By that point of my afternoon stroll through the event room, his collection did not appear much different than most of the other vendors. I glanced aimlessly over his display of random chips before Larry snapped at me, "Just what are you looking for?" I then gave Larry a patient look before responding to him, "I am a collector of stories." He returned a slightly irritated look and replied, "So you are looking for a social gathering?" Larry proceeded to tell me the details of how that unique chip was a misprint and how there was only 10 known to exist. It was an interesting piece of information; however, the story of how those 10 chips came into Larry's possession was simply fascinating. That was a story between Larry and me. After Larry finished, I took out two twenty dollar bills from my back pocket and handed it to him. I then asked him to recommend any two chips equal to that value. Upon completion of our transaction I slid the two chips into my side pocket as Larry placed the two bills neatly inside his wallet. Just before Larry and I said our farewells he gave me a glowing smile along with his personalized business chip. Perhaps it was his way of letting me know that one of those Peppermill chips would be preserved for me should our paths cross again in the future.

Looking back on our encounter I believe that 40 dollars played as little relevance on his day as those two chips played on mine. I believe Larry's smile came as a result of knowing there was still true value in a good story. (Knowing Larry, he can seem a little distant at times, but I know that Larry is a very knowledgeable member of our organization and is truly a wonderful person to know. ED)

The People behind the Names – Gilpin

If you collect casino memorabilia of any type, you have probably heard of Nevada and perhaps even Las Vegas! Many collectors do in fact collect items from there. But what do you know about how the name of many of the places and casinos that you collect, come from? No doubt to some, it makes a little difference, but to others, it only adds to their enjoyment of this hobby. The more you know the better collector you can be.

The Gilpin Hotel and Casino located in the historical mining city of Black Hawk Colorado is just a little south of the city of Gilpin, both of which are located in the County of Gilpin.



William Gilpin

William Gilpin was born in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. During his life, he was an explorer, lawyer, politician, land speculator, futurist writer, and a military officer in the Army during several wars. During his time in the Army, he accompanied John C. Fremont on his second expedition through the west. Gilpin was instrumental in the formation of the government of Oregon Territory.

Gilpin also served as the first governor of the Colorado Territory. However, his term in office was truncated to only a single year by scandalous financial dealings. After the demise of his political career, he made a large fortune as a land speculator in New Mexico, although his dealings were questionable and possibly illegal. In 1843, along the Santa Fe Trail he embarked westward with Frémont on his expedition to find a route over the continental divide. While passing through the region of present-day Colorado, he encountered evidence of placer gold in the region, but the information would go unused for at least another decade.

Gilpin's early intuition about gold in Colorado proved correct, and the region suddenly became the target for thousands of eager and hopeful prospectors in the ensuing Colorado Gold Rush.

Gilpin later joined the Republican Party. His political alignment with the new administration of U.S. President Abraham Lincoln was rewarded in 1861, when Lincoln appointed him governor of the newly formed Territory of Colorado.

While Governor, Gilpin issued drafts drawn on the Federal Treasury without authorization to pay for many threats to the territory. While these drafts were initially honored by local merchants, when news spread that the government in fact had NOT authorized any such measure, Gilpin's governorship soon came to an end.

Despite this, many places are named after him. The casino that bears his name sadly makes no mention of how or why it was named, nor does it mention any of his deeds, good or bad.

COLLECTING SPOTLIGHT

ORBIT INN

In each issue we shine the spotlight on a type of casino collectible or a single casino.

This time we look at the Orbit Inn.

This Las Vegas casino was open for about 23 years from the mid-1960s until the late 1980s.

Las Vegas history is filled with iconic casinos. I was fortunate enough to visit the Stardust and Dunes before they were demolished. But there are two casinos that opened in the 1960s that I wished I had a chance to visit - the Pussy Cat A-Go-Go and the Orbit Inn.

The next best thing to visiting casinos is being able to collect memorabilia from them. Thankfully there are plenty of Orbit Inn items available for sale by dealers and on eBay (more on the Pussy Cat A Go-Go in a future issue). More great news about Orbit Inn items is that all but one can be purchased for under \$100 and many of them for less than \$25.

The Chip Rack 18 lists twenty chips, www.ChipGuide.com has about 40 items, and as I write this (July 2018) there are 40 Orbit Inn listings on eBay. This gives a collector enough items to keep busy but not so many that getting them all is impossible.

Chips & Token

Most of the documented Orbit Inn collectibles are chips. All of their chips, except for the \$100, are hot stamped. I have discovered that the chips' condition available for sale vary. Some Orbit Inn chips are extremely worn with the foil barely visible, some not at all, and others look almost new. The hat & cat mold chips issued in the 60s-70s vary the most while the dice & card mold chips issued in the 80s tend to be in much better condition. NCV chips were issued in the late 80s, most of those appear to be in very good condition.

Pricing for Orbit Inn hat & cane, hot stamped chips is as varied as their condition and on eBay does but not seem to be a factor when people price. I have purchased chips for a little as \$2-\$4 that others have listed at \$20 or more. If you buy Orbit Inn chips on eBay search carefully and be patient - there is no reason to pay \$25 for an average chip when it is likely a better condition chip will be list later for much less. Use can usually find the NCV chips in sets and for about \$4-\$5 a chip.

The \$100 chip is the only one issued with an inlay. These were issued in 1976 and the few I have personally seen appear to be in great condition. Your best bet to purchase one of these is eBay auctions. Auctions in the last 12 months have been won for as low as \$65 up to \$100. Patience and persistence is key.

There is only one known Orbit Inn token. I own two: one is in great condition and the other is heavily scratched. You can still find Orbit Inn tokens for \$4-\$6.

Dice, Matchbooks, Postcards and other stuff

Orbit Inn dice are often posted on eBay but like the chips, prices are varied. Some sellers are asking \$40-\$60 for a single, poor condition die while some dice (set of two) auctions can be won for \$15-\$25. I know of two different Orbit Inn matchbooks; a black one and a blue one. You can usually buy these for \$3-\$5 individually or less per piece if you buy them in a lots of 10-12. I have seen four different Orbit Inn postcards on eBay which typically sell for \$5-\$10.

I purchased a room key fob for \$25. I also found a coin cup (pictured above) and two menus on eBay from the Orbit Inn. I think the most likely place to find unknown collectibles from the Orbit Inn will be paper goods.

My closing thoughts

I became fascinated with the Orbit Inn after seeing the \$100 chip for the first time almost 10 years ago. I have had no trouble finding collectibles from other Club members and eBay. I will repeat what I wrote earlier - search carefully and be patient. Prices for the Orbit Inn items are all over the map, especially on eBay. I guess people think that because it is closed the items are worth lots of money. Never pay \$25 for an average condition Orbit Inn chip or matchbook. There are plenty of Orbit Inn collectibles out there.

Jean & Primm

Primm Val

Less than an hour south of Las Vegas are the towns of Jean and Primm, Nevada.

Carole and I visited the town & four casinos in March 2017.

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If you leave Las Vegas and travel south on Interstate 15 for 30 miles you will arrive at the town of Jean, NV. Jean is somewhat unique in that its 2010 US Census had the population at zero.

As you might expect of a town with no residents there is not much to Jean. The courthouse and post office service the nearby towns of Goodsprings and Primm. The Jean Sport Aviation Center, an all-female prison, a Nevada Highway Patrol substation, Las Vegas Rock (a meta-quartzite stone mining company), two gas stations and a packaging building are also located in Jean.

MGM used to own two casinos in Jean, the Gold Strike and Nevada Landing. MGM planned to build a community of houses, businesses, shops and a new casino so they shut-down the Nevada Landing in 2007 and demolished it in 2008. The planned community never materialized. In 2015 MGM sold the Gold Strike to Jett Gaming which is owned by the Herbst family.

The casino has about 250 slot machines and 8-10 table games. We were told by the pit boss that the plan is to rebrand the casino as Terrible's Road House. Other than the player's card and TITO nothing appeared to have been rebranded. When we visited, the hotel lobby had a display of TV/movie cars. I collected chips, two variations of \$1 tokens, a TITO and a player's card during our visit.

Continuing south

Travel another 10 miles south on Interstate 15 is the Nevada-California state border and the town of Primm, NV. Primm is the home of three casinos totaling 2600 rooms, and a shopping mall of fash ion outlet stores. Unlike Jean, Primm has permanent residents.

The area originally was owned by a gas station owner named Pete MacIntyre. Primm history remembers him as "Whiskey Pete.". The aptly named Whiskey Pete's Hotel & Casino is the oldest of the three resorts it opening in 1977. Oddly, the exterior of the building is designed to look like a medieval castle and the interior is western themed. The hotel's lobby is home to the car in which infamous bank robbers Bonnie and Clyde were killed in plus other artifacts from the duo. The Primadonna Resort & Casino opened next in 1990 and was renamed the Primm Valley Resort in 1997. The fashion outlet mall is connected to the Primm Valley Resort.

Las Vegas Boulevard South ends at the state line in front of the fashion outlets. It turns into Lotto Store Road. The Lotto Store at Primm is located on the state line and sells California lottery tickets. Nevada has no State lottery so this is the closet place for people in the Las Vegas metropolitan area to buy tickets.

Buffalo Bill's is the newest of Primm's resorts; it opened in 1994. Buffalo Bill's has several amusement rides including a flume ride, a roller coaster and virtual roller coaster experience. This resort has the largest hotel of the three with almost half of the hotel rooms in Primm. It also has a 6500 seat arena.

I was able to collect chips, TITOs and player cards during our visit to Primm. I even got dice from all of the casinos at one of the gift shops for less than 50ϕ each.



The three resorts have gone thru several ownership changes in their history. They were built by Gary Primm and operated under the Primadonna Casino Resorts name starting in 1990. Gary was part of the development team for New York-New York and in 1999 sold the resorts to MGM. They were sold in 2007 to Herbst Gaming.

Herbst Gaming entered Chapter 11 bankruptcy in 2009 and emerged from it in 2010. They changed their name to Affinity Gaming in early 2011. Towards the end of 2016 private equity firm Z Capital Partners, which owned 41% of Affinity Gaming, purchased the remaining 59%. Besides the Primm resorts Affinity Gaming owns casinos in Las Vegas & Sparks, NV, Colorado, Missouri and Iowa.

A nice day away from LV

We love Las Vegas but it was nice to get away from the city for a day. If you are looking for an easy car drive, lower table minimum bets, quieter casinos and a change of scenery then a trip to Jean & Primm might just be for you. You will still have plenty of time to get back for a night-time show on the Strip.

Next issue we travel north and visit Mesquite, NV.







First scan or take a picture of the item to be submitted. Scans are preferred because they usually provide better results. For best image results, look at the Tips and Techniques guide that is available on the SUBMISSION page. Then fill out the form, attach the image and press SUBMIT. It is really that simple. The ChipGuide accepts casino items used as money (chips, tokens, etc.), equipment (dice, playing cards, etc.) and other items as long as they contain the casino name, logo or picture (ashtrays, matchbooks, postcards, etc.). Please use the COMMENTS box on the form to provide any information needed to put the item on the ChipGuide, if it is not apparent, like colors of the chip and inserts and the date that the item was in use.



In every casino and item information box, there is a blue UPDATES button. When pressed, it formats an email to send to a ChipGuide Administrator with information to improve information about the casino or item.

Casino Chip Scanning Tips

By Charles Kaplan, LM-115-148

Chip Preparation

- 1) Remove chip from holder. If the chip is in a plastic flip or has any covering, the covering will cause some lighting distortion.
- 2) Clean chip, if needed, if the cleaning will improve the appearance. Some chips should definitely not be cleaned.

Using a Scanner – Use a CCD (not CIS) scanner. CIS scanners do not render certain colors correctly, such as orange or pink.

- 1) Set resolution to 300 to 600 DPI. The higher the resolution (DPI) the better the results.
- 2) If your scanner software allows, use the mode that gives you the entire scanner bed (no cropping or adjustments)
- 3) Make a "frame" for the chip using blank side of 3.5x5" index card and draw thick black border with magic marker
- 4) Place chip 1" from the side and top of the scanner and put index card on top of the chip, aligned in the corner

Using a Camera - it is more difficult to get a good image of a chip with a camera. You need a steady hand or tripod.

- 1) Put the chip on low, flat and level surface, if possible use a solid colored or white background under the chip
- 2) Use indirect natural light, no flash or direct sunlight. The lighting in a casino is fine, no flash needed.
- 3) Take picture from directly above the chip and as close to the chip as possible. Otherwise the image distorted, not round.
- 4) Check results and reshoot making adjustments

Image Editing with PhotoScape (free and safe download from http://ckaplan.com/PhotoScape_V3.7.exe)

- 1) <u>LIGHTING CORRECTION</u> lighten, darken or adjust contrast, if needed, by pressing the "BRIGHT, COLOR" button at the bottom, center of the home page, use slide bars to make adjustments, click "OK"
- 2) ALIGN
 - a. Align tool is on the home page (rotate arbitrary), 1st button on the left over "RESIZE"
 - b. If > 15° adjustment or image is tightly cropped, go to the "ROTATE" tab and click on "KEEP THE ORIGINAL SIZE"
 - c. Use the slide bar to align, focusing on a straight up or down line or symmetrical points
 - d. Click "OK" when done
- 3) <u>CROP</u>
 - a. Go to the "CROP" window and click on "CROP ROUND IMAGE"
 - b. Enlarge image to make cropping easier by pressing the "ZOOM IN" button (circle with a plus sign)
 - c. Position cursor at top of the chip, press and hold the left mouse button, and drag to the bottom of the chip and slightly to the right and release the left mouse button
 - d. Drag the left and right anchors to the sides of the chip
 - e. Check the cropped size, 2nd box from the left under the image, and make sure that width "w:" is equal to height "h:", if not make adjustments by moving the anchor points
 - f. If anchor points are correctly at the top, bottom, left and right and width does not equal height, it is OK, as long as it is within 1%. If width=309, then length can be from 306 to 312
 - g. Click "CROP" to make the crop

4) <u>RESIZE</u>

- a. Go back to the HOME page, and click on the "RESIZE" button (center, near bottom)
- b. Object Sizes
 - i. Round objects, regular Preferred: 450x450, Minimum: 240x240
 - ii. Round objects, large Maximum: 950x950
 - iii. Cards slot, playing, business, room key w:525
 - iv. TITO's, post cards w:750
 - v. Large items maximum width: 950
- c. For round objects, if width does not equal height
 - i. Resize width to 450 (or 240)
 - ii. Unclick "PRESERVE ASPECT RATIO"
 - iii. Resize height to 450 (or 240)
 - iv. Click on "OK" to complete resizing

5) <u>SAVE</u>

- a. Click on the "SAVE" button
- b. Any name is OK, keep it simple
- c. Use "QUALITY SETTING" of 85%

The program is offered free of charge and available to everyone. The Mentoring Program is specifically designed for new casino chip collectors offering a wealth of information and experience of our seasoned casino chip and memorabilia collectors.

Seasoned collectors have gone through many a trial and tribulation, learning as they go and learning from their mistakes over the years. The Program

The questions are designed to best identify your interests and to match you with a suitable mentor for your particular collecting interests.

Initial Stage: lasts for a period of 30 days. During this time, both parties will be encouraged to communicate back and forth through e-mails, and/or telephone. The mentee (new collector) will be open to ask any and all questions he may be interested in, and the mentor (experienced collector) will address the questions, giving advice and direction.

At the conclusion of the initial 30-day initial stage, the program chairman will contact both parties to see if both wish to continue. If both parties are pleased with how things are going, they may choose to continue for an additional 11 months. This short initial period is particularly good for beginners who just need a little help and direction while getting started.

Either the mentee or the mentor can conclude the relationship at anytime. This may need to be done because of unforeseen real life issues that may arise.

The program will continue for a maximum period of one year from the beginning of the initial active date, with a review after six months.



Logo Usage Policy

The Club has certain logos and symbols which it must protect in order to protect its reputation in the collectibles community. No member is allowed to use the Club name, logo or symbol other than is approved by the by-laws or as otherwise specifically approved in writing by the Board of Directors.

- Only members in good standing may identify themselves as members of the Club
- Any member who identifies himself/herself as a member must affix or state their membership number so as not to confuse the public.
- "Identifies" includes advertising, announcements, business cards, internet websites, internet or live auctions, e-mails and any and all types of communication.
- Every member must make an effort not to confuse the public or lead the public to think that the member represents or speaks for the Club, other than those officers who actually do speak for the Club or those who have been authorized by the Board to speak for the Club.
- No event, show, auction or convention shall use the Club name, logo or symbol for any reason whatsoever unless it is an event, show, auction or convention run by the Club.
- The Board has approved a "Member's Logo" which contains the member's membership number. Only that logo may be used by members in their advertising, promotions, business cards, auctions, etc.
- Any other use of the Club name, logo or symbol must be submitted to the Board of Directors for their approval prior to such use.
- The entities formerly known as "Chapters" are prohibited from using the Club name, logo or symbol as representative of their organization

CCA Claims Form

Up until now, there has never been a uniform, standardized way of filing a Claim against another member for an alleged Code of Ethics violation. Claims have been filed over the years in formats ranging from hand written notes, typed 5-6 page letters to just an email saying "I want to file a claim against ______".

Most of the time the information provided to the Club is vague and/or incomplete. The Claims Director may spend more time gathering basic information that should have been provided in the first place, than on resolving the issue at hand.

This form provides all the basic information needed by the Club, in written form, first hand from the member filing the complaint.

The process will work as follows:

- 1. Fill out the form completely, sign and date it.
- 2. Forward it the Vice-President..
- 3. Vice-President will make an initial determination on the Claim.
- If further action or investigation is warranted, the Vice-President will forward the form to the Claims Director to open
 Claims Investigation
 - a Claims Investigation.
- 5. The Claims Director will work to mutually resolve the matter between the parties or if that is not possible, make a recommendation to the Board of Directors for the appropriate action.
- 6. The Board will act on the recommendation and the final report of the Claims Director. The parties involved will be notified of the final decision of the Board by the Vice-President. If you find it necessary to file a Claim against a fellow Club member, please help us to resolve the matter as quickly as possible by using the Claims Form.

Reward Fund

Several years ago, the Club had a standing offer to help deter theft of member's collections. Somewhere along the way it was either dropped, forgotten or just faded into obscurity. The Board has voted to reintroduce the reward offer. We would like to thank Jim Reilly for his research and assistance with this project. The terms of the offer are similar to those used by the ANA. Please contact any member of the BOD for further information.

The Club offers a reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of any person or persons charged with the theft of any part of a club member's collection.

The Club will pay a reward as follows:

If the retail value of the stolen property is less than \$5,000, the reward is \$260 If \$5000 to \$20,000, the reward is \$500

If greater than \$20,000, the reward is \$1000.

The purpose of this reward offer is to increase the likelihood of apprehending and convicting those who steal from club members, as well as to increase the likelihood of recovering the stolen property. The reward offer, however, is not intended to reimburse any club member's loss. It is each member's responsibility to maintain insurance against losses of this kind.
